		Dr John Gommans is the Chief Medical Office (Hospital) for HBDHB, Chair of the HB Clinical Research Committee and an experienced researcher.
16:40	17:00	Bobbie Cameron – "What factors influence Community Nurses providing outreach services to successfully engage underserved populations?"
		The perceptions of five community nurses from throughout New Zealand were explored in order to provide insight into what factors guide them in engaging communities defined as underserved. Four broad themes were identified. These included: nurses' connections with the community; building a therapeutic nurse-client relationship; identifying factors to ensuring clinical competence and support; and nurses' recommendations to enhance the community outreach service
17:00	17:20	Rachel Forrest, Lee-Anne Taylor and Levi Armstrong – PATU Up! Fighting fat to be fighting fit: The Hinu Wero The PATU© gym acts as an 'Urban Marae', a place of community where people wanted to be in order to stay connected and improve their health so they can better contribute to their community. Those attending strongly connect with the concept of the warrior and perceived PATU© as a positive 'gang' fighting a war against Māori health issues such as obesity.
17:20	17:40	Sue Chapman, Jennifer Roberts, and Donna Foxall – Measuring Hauora Māori: The Meke Meter The development of culturally appropriate contemporary research tools to evaluate the impact of Māori health initiatives, such as the PATU© initiative, are vital in the search for new knowledge to combat health inequities in New Zealand. Our findings highlighted that a non- western approach using image based tools was preferred over written surveys. This lead to the development of the Meke Meter.
